Statement of intent

Pupil Premium pupils may face barriers to learning . It is vitally important that all teachers know who is a pupil premium child, track their progress carefully and identify barriers to learning. These may relate to inward and outward mobility, home circumstances, early development , access to resources.

Barrier to Learning - returning to school after illness or school holidays, emotional wellbeing concerns linked to attachment, illness in family .

In recent years emotional well being and school avoidance have increased and are areas targeted with Pupil Premium funding.

- It is our intent to provide every child with quality first education, responding to their needs and knowing each child as an individual.

5	To address barriers to learning as they occur, thus preventing issues regarding child progress in school
